You will soon die because you are so thin."


She asked, "Do you want me to be a widow for the rest of my life?"

He alone worked in the kitchen near the well and allowed no one to help him cook.


One day the workmen sent Hen to get them water to drink. While getting water,

"We didn't close the door of the house," he said at last. "If I do not run back and close the door, someone will smell the soup and go in and eat it."


So Cat said, "Go back and close the door. I will wait at the side of the road. Please be quick. It is becoming dark and we will not find anything in the market."
